


# Welcome to Luxembourg

# Welcome to the 2nd conference on Undone Science in Computer Science

Our goal with the Undone Computer Science conference, first held in Nantes in 2024, was to create a space for ethical and epistemological reflections in and on computer science, by and for practitioners of this field, also attracting social scientists, philosophers and historians of science, law scholars, etc., interested in this inquiry. This year's edition hosts submitted talks covering diverse aspects of computer science, two keynotes, a panel, and an invited talk related to the Undone Computer Science special issue of the journal *Philosophia Scientiæ*.

The quality and quantity of submissions, the international reach of the conference, and its interdisciplinarity in terms of topics and participants, show the demand for this reflexive space. As this success raises the question of a possible “Undone CS” community, we wanted to share with you some of the challenges this entails:

- Where do we want to go? Should a conference on “Undone Science” be recurring, or is it by its nature ephemeral? Given that the title suggests that its topics are always due for renewal, are we able to formulate research questions around which a community will gather regularly?
- We want a friendly and low-stakes conference where practising computer scientists are encouraged to (finally!) ask that the elephant in their domain is addressed, even if they do not see themselves as specialists in epistemology and/or ethics. The 3-day format of our conference eventually had us accept fewer talks than we would have wanted. Which format would help us accomplish our goals better?

Over the three days that we will spend together, we are hoping to discuss these questions with you and hear what you think!







Approx. 1 hour



# Practical tips




In late March, Luxembourg experiences cool early spring weather, with temperatures typically ranging between 6°C and 14°C (43°F to 57°F). You can expect a mix of sunshine and clouds, occasional rain showers, and light to moderate winds as winter transitions into spring.



We recommend bringing an umbrella in case of rain, a light jacket or coat, and comfortable shoes. The dress code for the conference is business casual or casual. Please wear your name badge at all times, as it is required for entry to all events.



Luxembourg is in the Central European Time (CET) zone, which is offset GMT+1.



Currency in Luxembourg is the Euro.



Luxembourg uses plug types C and F. Type C has two round pins, while type F has two round pins with two earth clips on the sides. The standard voltage is 230V with a frequency of 50Hz.

## History & Transformation


